Returning this January, **Buy Nothing New Month** is all about moving beyond simply **recycling** and **reusing**, to **reducing** the

amount of new stuff that we buy, and by extension, the amount of waste that we create. It's an opportunity to celebrate the money (and carbon) saving opportunities of shopping second hand, to educate our communities about ways to reduce waste, and to celebrate the wonderful work being done by local authorities with pop-up swap shops, repair cafés and more.

#### A gardener's guide

We are still in the midst of an unusually mild winter, albeit it a very wet one, so it has been quite difficult to "put the garden to bed"! With waterlogged lawns and borders, it's tricky to know where to focus our attention in between downpours, but here are some jobs to tackle in the next couple of months as the weather allows:

- Clear up any storm damage. Torn stems and branches will need to be cut or sawn off to leave a clean cut, avoiding further damage or infection.
- Winter prune roses, taking them back to a third of last year's growth and choose an outward facing bud to prune to. Finish the task with a good mulch and feed, but if using rich compost such as manure, don't allow it to touch the stems of the plant.
- Tidy summer flowering shrubs, reducing new stems by a third and removing old stems that are no longer as productive.
- 4. Winter prune apple and pear trees.
- Clean and service tools, lawn mowers, scarifiers and other equipment. Clean out and repair sheds and give greenhouse glass a good scrub to maximise light in the coming months.
- Make any structural changes now so you can sit back and enjoy when the warm weather arrives!

#### **Cirencester Park**

Visiting Cirencester Park in 2024?

From Spring 2024, how you access Cirencester Park will change with the introduction of Community Passes (for which the Preston residents will be eligible), Annual Passes and Day Passes. The Park will still be open daily for visitors to enjoy. # Parking in the village

On behalf of all who use the access road to Village Farm, parking near to the entrance is becoming more and more of an issue.

Please could we request that parking directly opposite and in close proximity to the entrance be done only in extremely busy periods when there is no other parking available. Ideally parking in a safe position away from the entrance and before the entrance to the church (if you are coming up the village) would be ideal.

It is becoming a safety issue as other vehicles either entering or exiting Village Farm (or even vehicles travelling up and down the village) having to navigate around these parked vehicles and end up being on the wrong side of the road dead opposite this junction. The risk of having an accident with an oncoming vehicle is great, particularly in this bad weather when braking suddenly is even more of a risk.
